3, 2, 1 Grow!


This topic is all about growing, whether that be people or plants! What do we all need to grow? Through the

different subjects we will be learning all about the world around us and what it all needs to thrive. We will be planting seeds to grow food to make


pizzas, learning how to make our brains grow each day and how to keep ourselves healthy and growing too.

Home Learning

Reading:

- To ensure success, all children are expected to read <u>at least 5</u> <u>times per week</u> at home.
- Home reading needs to be recorded by an adult in the blue reading diary.
- Entries will be counted Thursday to Thursday in order to earn a stamp on the church tower reward chart. Once your child has filled their chart they will be rewarded in Friday's Celebration Worship. You will be invited to this if your child has won an award (Thursday evening via Dojo).


Prior Learning

- In nursery the children explored the nature woodland area during 'Muddy Mondays' and investigated the plants and flowers in the area. They shared stories about growing and planting.
- In reception the children have shared stories about planting and growing. They planted beans after listening to 'Jack and the Beanstalk'.
- In year one the children have investigated the parts of a flower and planted seeds to observe them grow.

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CORE SUBJECTS





As **readers**, the children will continue developing their word reading, fluency and comprehension skills. They will continue to receive a daily phonics lesson, focusing on the spelling and grammar elements of the Year 2 curriculum, including punctuation, tenses and sentence types. They will also be supported with guided reading sessions each week by the class staff. The children will hear, share and discuss a range of texts to help develop their reading skills and to learn more about growing in our topic, this will include stories such as 'The secret sky garden' and non-fiction texts about growing and cooking.

As writers, the children will use the Oliver's Vegetables and Fruit Salad books as inspiration for their own short stories. They will write an informal letter introducing themselves to their Year 3 teacher, writing a letter correctly in letter format and describing themselves as the main subject of their writing including what they are looking forward to when starting their next learning journey in Year 3.

There will also be lots of writing across other subjects such as labelling seeds, recording science experiments and writing instructions on how to make a pizza.



As **scientists**, the children will learn about plants and observe them. They will learn how seeds and bulbs grow into mature plants including planting their own vegetable patch produce in preparation for making pizzas.

They will continue to learn about growing and will find out and describe how plants need water, light and a suitable temperature to grow and stay healthy. The children will carry out experiments based upon this and make predictions on how a bean will grow if it does not have water/light/nutrients or a suitable temperature.

The children will also find out about the growing of animals including humans and describe the importance for humans of exercise, eating the right amounts of types of food, and hygiene.



As **mathematicians**, the children will be learning about time and the children will focus on how to read time and write the time to five minutes, including quarter past/to the hour and draw the hands on a clockface to show these times. They will complete more practical tasks to reinforce their skills.

The children will learn about statistics and learn how to interpret data from the information given. Children will create their own tally charts and build upon this by creating tables, pictograms and block diagrams. They will interpret the data and answer questions based on the information presented to them.

They will then move on to position and direction and children will use the language of position, which way is left and which way is right. They will then think about other language to describe position, such as above, below and between. They will use mathematical vocabulary to describe position, direction and movement, including movement in a straight line and distinguishing between rotation as a turn and in terms of right angles for quarter, half and three-quarter turns (clockwise and anticlockwise).



As **theologians**, the children will learn about scared places. We will find out about the places that are sacred for Christians and Muslims. The children will have the opportunity to find out about the main features of sacred places such as churches and mosques. We will learn about the names and functions of the different features as well as thinking about why music is so important in worship at these sacred places.

The children will continue to join in with our various school prayers which are said at key points of the day and attend whole school daily Collective Worship in the hall which this term focusses on our four Langley Mill Foundations: Aspire, Learn, Respect and Serve. Some of the children will be selected to be part of the Collective Worship Team, taking an active role in planning, organising, delivering and evaluating daily worship.

FOUNDATION SUBJECTS



As **artists**, the children will design and make collages using a range of materials, both natural and manmade to create different patterns and pictures of plants and flowers, researching the art created by Artist Mary Delany as inspiration.





As **designers**, the children will design, make and evaluate a pizza using produce grown in the school allotment.



As dancers, the children will continue to develop their sequencing skills, using different types movements to create and repeat short sequences. They will also work with others in short sequences and take a greater responsibility for working safely in their own space. The children will create their own dance sequences based on fruit and vegetables from the BBC Time to Move lessons and evaluate each other with praise.

As **athletes**, the children will be staying active and following the **Do Think Feel PE** scheme where the children will be practising athletic events and preparing for our sports day.



As **historians**, the children will research significant historical figures. They will continue to find out about the brilliant botanist - Jane Colden who was the first female botanist, and they will research all about the Plant Hunters, (Banks, Douglas, Baret, Dyke).

As **geographers**, the children will look at Human and Physical Geography and they will use geographical vocabulary to refer to key physical features including, soil, vegetation, season and weather and key human features, including farms and identify seasonal and daily weather patterns in the UK linked to farming and seasonal produce in the summer months.



As **young citizens**, the children will continue to focus on what it means to be a Bucket Filler to ensure that we continue to be a bucket filling school full of positivity and kindness.

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The children will also follow Derbyshire's PSHE Matters Scheme, and the unit of work titled 'Drug education'. The topic will focus on medicines and explore the role of medicines and how we use them when we are ill/ prevent illness/ manage a condition. The children will understand that household products, including medicines, can be harmful if not used properly.



As **technologists**, the children will learn how to show and interpret data by creating their own digital pictogram and be able to use technology purposefully to create, organise, store, manipulate and retrieve digital content.

Through Computing lessons, the children will continue to learn how to use IT equipment and the internet safely and in this particular unit they will learn If something happens that makes me feel sad, worried, uncomfortable, or frightened they will be able to give examples of when and how to speak to an adult they can trust.



As musicians, the children will reflect, rewind and replay their previous learning from the Charanga musical unit. They will take part in a range of musical activities to build on their knowledge and understanding about the interrelated dimensions of music. Throughout the unit they will sing the song, play instruments with the song, improvise with the song, compose with the song and perform the songs that they have learnt. The children will also learn songs about people and their bodies.

The children will also learn and sing songs for the leavers' concert.
